When the D-Day museum opened in New Orleans in 2000, my folks, John and Frances Cheesman went to attend the grand opening. Johnny had landed on Utah beach at Normandy on the first morning June 6, 1944. For some reason Joyce and I did not find out about the opening till the last minute but we hot footed it to the "Big Easy" just in time. On the day of the opening, Johnny, Rosie, Joyce and I went down to the Super Dome for the ceremonies. Mom stayed at the house. She did not care for crowds.

When we got to the dome was when we found out that Johnny had not understood he should have filled out some forms for priority seating. Rosie instantly took charge and grabbed the first person that looked like they had any authority. She explained to this individual in no uncertain terms that her brother, John Cheesman, had saved Europe from the Nazi's almost by himself. As a result, Johnny and I wound up in wonderful seats very close to the stage so we could see and hear all the dignitaries really well. Unfortunately, Rosie and Joyce got stuck in the rafters but we all still had a good time. Rosie always made sure her family was treated right. She was really the reason for going to New Orleans. It will never be the same with out her.
